The Feast of St. Luke

The feast day of our patron, St. Luke the Evangelist, is on Saturday, October 18. Luke is the author of the Gospel of Luke and the Acts of the Apostles. His Gospel was believed to have been written between 70 and 85 AD.

Educated as a physician in Antioch (part of present-day Turkey), Luke accompanied St. Paul on his travels as his personal physician and, in effect, a biographer. St. Paul referred to him as "our beloved physician."

Scholars have ranked Luke among the top historians of his time. He was the only evangelist to incorporate the personal testimony of the Blessed Mother, whose role in Christ's life emerges most clearly in his Gospel.

In addition, Luke was an artist. Tradition credits him with painting several icons of the Blessed Mother. One of the portraits believed to have been painted by Luke is known as the "Salvation of the Roman People" (Salus Populi Romani) and is housed in the Basilica of Saint Mary Major in Rome.

ASK A PRIEST

We're excited to announce a new monthly column that will feature questions from children in all grades of our Faith Formation Program. We asked children, including those in Teens for Christ to submit questions, and Father Templeton has kindly agreed to answer one or two each month. This column may also help you answer questions you receive from your children at home.

Q: Why do you chant/sing at Mass?

A: The Church encourages chanting/singing at Masses on Sundays and high feast days as a way to distinguish Sunday Mass from daily Mass. Plus, chanting and singing are common ways for a group of people to connect and worship together.

The Church has terms for this. There are "daily Masses" and "Sunday/feast day Masses." A daily Mass would be a Mass where there is no chanting/singing; this is more appropriate for daily Masses. (Sometimes at daily Masses, you will have a hymn or two, and that's perfectly fine!)

A high Mass will have a lot of chanting/singing as a way of showing the importance and uniqueness of the Sunday Mass. Every Sunday Mass is considered a "little Easter" insofar as we celebrate and are reminded of the Lord's Resurrection on Sundays.

"Gregorian Chant, as the supreme model of sacred music, should be given pride of place in liturgical celebrations, especially on Sundays and feast days. It is fitting that the priest chants or sings the liturgical prayers to maintain the solemnity of the celebration."

"The celebration of Mass is the Church's primary means of worship, and its rites should be carried out with appropriate reverence. It is desirable that parts of the liturgy, such as the Gloria, Sanctus, and Agnus Dei be chanted, in order to enhance the solemnity of the celebration."

Blood donation is a act of compassion and community service that can save countless lives. Every day, hospitals and clinics rely on donated blood to treat patients undergoing surgeries, injured in accidents, or battling life-threatening conditions like cancer and anemia. You or someone you love may have needed a blood transfusion at one time.

Did you know a single donation can help up to three people? This makes it one of the most impactful ways an individual can contribute to public health. Despite medical advancements, there is NO substitute for human blood. A consistent supply is essential to meet both routine and emergency medical needs.

The act of giving blood is safe, quick, and simple, yet its impact is profound. By participating, individuals not only help save lives but also support a healthcare system that depends on the generosity of voluntary donors.

The St. Luke Blood Drive was started over 35 years ago by lifelong parishioner, Charlie Ward. Back in the early days, he would wait at the end of Mass with a clipboard and sign folks up. Around 2003, he recruited "Charlie's Angels" to assist with the blood drives. Dottie Bramhall, Sue Sansevero, and Jane Hodapp have all spent over 20 years volunteering in this ministry. Trish Quinlivan joined the Angels in 2017.

A single car accident victim can require as many as 100 units of blood


One donation can save up to 3 people
