Called to Serve

An Interview With Father Andrew Templeton

“My first serious thought about becoming a priest, I think, was around the age of 14,” Father Andrew Templeton recalls. He was in Alabama on a youth retreat with his pastor, Father Matthew Buettner, who asked the teens to consider what the Lord wanted them to do with their lives. “I began to realize that the priesthood was something He was drawing me towards. And it was through Adoration, constant prayer, and silence that I found peace in the priesthood and that life,” states Father Templeton.

The Early Years

Raised two blocks from St. Michael Church in Gastonia, Father Templeton attended their elementary and middle school. During his time at St. Michael, he participated in basketball, baseball, and cross country. He then attended Hunter Huss High School, and at the age of 16, entered the dual enrollment program through Gaston College (community college).

In speaking about his family, you could sense the admiration he has for his parents, Lonikay and Jeffrey Templeton. Father Templeton mentions that his mother also attended St. Michael’s Elementary and Hunter Huss High School.

His parents are first-generation college graduates, so education has always been important in his family. His older brother, Zachary, holds dual bachelor's degrees in physics and mathematics. Father Templeton himself holds dual bachelor's degrees in philosophy and Latin, with a minor in historical studies, from St. Joseph's Seminary/Belmont Abbey College, and a master's in theology from Mount St. Mary's Seminary and School of Theology in Cincinnati.

Journey to the Priesthood

Throughout his school years, he served as an altar boy at St. Michael under Monsignor Roger Arnsperger. After Mass, Father Templeton would linger in the sacristy and have meaningful conversations with the Monsignor about topics such as natural law. Father Templeton counts Monsignor Arnsperger among his foundational mentors.

Naturally, he also counts Father Buettner as a significant influence in his seminarian life. "After Alabama, I began speaking with Father Buettner every month or every two months, talking about the priesthood and discernment. That went on until I was about 16-17, and then I asked him, 'When can I join the seminary?'" Father Templeton smiled.

Seminary Life

Once enrolled in seminary, he felt he had made the right choice. "You begin, and things just feel right. And then there are other times where things are difficult. But at the end of the school year, you reflect and know this is where I need to be. I describe it in the sense of discernment. There are three different entities that are discerning. There's the seminarian, there is the Church, represented by your formators, the priests, and then there's the Holy Spirit. And all three have a say."

Seminary Curriculum

His preferred courses were Canon Law and Moral Theology. He found Epistemology, the study of how we know things, and Metaphysics, which looks at the fundamental nature of reality, to be more challenging. "Philosophical studies are the foundation of theology," says Father Templeton.

Inspired by Saints

When asked about a favorite saint, he mentions his Confirmation saint, Blessed Pier Giorgio Frassati, who Pope Leo will canonize on September 7, 2025. He feels "...connected to Pier Giorgio Frassati because he was so young." Frassati was deeply spiritual and challenged others to follow Jesus in a fun way. For example, he would invite his friends along on a hike but also invite a priest. Or he would challenge his friends to a game of pool, and if he won the bet, they would have to attend Mass with him.

Another saint who inspires Father Templeton is Saint Charbel Makhlof. He says, "Saint Charbel is an interesting saint. He is a Lebanese monk, and he just has this unshakable faith when it comes to divine providence that is really inspiring, and that's what I love about him."

Preparing for Homilies

He begins preparing for his homily on Mondays by reading the scripture so that he can reflect on it throughout the week.

"I have a few commentaries and things that I read in conjunction with the scripture to give me ideas as to what I want to talk about. Sometimes it'll give me historical context; sometimes it'll give me more spiritual context of where it fits with the rest of scripture." Sometimes, Father Templeton will look up the Greek version of a word and its etymology, as this can reveal what the author is trying to convey.

Final Reflections

Father Templeton observes, "I've noticed there is such a strong communal dynamic at this parish and that people are very generous with their service - all the different ways that they help the parish. I'm just excited to be part of that."

He adds, "There's a document on the priesthood called *Presbyterorum Ordinis*, which discusses how the priest is sanctified through his work. I'm looking forward to learning how to serve as a priest from Father Paul."



Hispanic Music Ministry

Every Sunday at 1:00 p.m., the Spanish Mass at St. Luke is enlivened by the music of Coro Alabaré, the parish's Spanish music ministry. Founded by the Leugers family in 2006, the ministry has evolved from a family affair to a multinational group featuring a variety of musical styles. Musicians from Puerto Rico, Guatemala, Venezuela, Mexico, and the United States have accompanied a group of singers from Mexico, El Salvador, Ecuador, the Dominican Republic, Puerto Rico, Colombia, and the United States. The group has included children as young as 8 and seniors over 80.

Our Spanish speaking congregants come from many different countries with different musical traditions. The Spanish music ministry performs in a variety of styles, choosing familiar songs from the parishioners' countries of origin as well as new compositions that are popular across Latin America.

In addition to the 1:00 p.m. Mass, the group provides music for weddings, funerals, quinceañeras (15th birthday celebrations). They performed for several years at the St. Luke festival, featuring traditional Mexican rancheras in one year and popular songs from Puerto Rico in another. The annual Feast of our Lady of Guadalupe, around December 12, has been a special occasion for many years, featuring bilingual music and involving the entire St. Luke community.

Led by Asunción Aguilar and Cynthia Leugers, the Spanish music ministry is open to parishioners of all ages and backgrounds. Youth who have taken some Spanish in school can learn to sing the songs. Instrumentalists don't need to understand Spanish at all. They also have great parties with incredible food!

- Pay off Fairview church loan (balance approximately \$2,368,881)
- Sustain funding and to build a new Family Life & Administration Building (projected cost \$9 Million)
- Adhere to diocesan guidelines
- Work with the Pastor, Finance Council, Building & Planning Committee, and all commissions and ministries to promote fiscal accountability
- Ensure commission, ministry and parishioner interests are addressed and represented
- Work to integrate initiatives and communication across pastoral, administrative staff, and ministry teams.


Survey Demographics
